

Having grown up in the Midwest, I expected great soil and plentiful rainfall in Colorado. What a surprise when at least 50% of my plants died the first year. Not wanting to give up on gardening, I enrolled in the Master Gardener Program through the Colorado State University Cooperative Extension.

So I became an NGC Flower Show Judge in 2002 and have been judging at Standard Flower Shows and county fairs ever since. My favorite flower is the tall bearded iris! If I am not outside gardening, I am at a lake or at our camp in the mountains!

Whipped Cinnamon Pumpkin Butter Make it ahead!

Whipped Cinnamon Pumpkin Butter is bursting with fall flavors and perfect on bread, muffins, pancakes, waffles, and just about anything else!



Ingredients

- 2 sticks (8 ounces) unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg (optional)
- Pinch salt
- 1/ cup plus 2 tablespoons pure pumpkin puree
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Directions

1. In a large bowl, use an electric mixer to beat the butter until light and fluffy. Add the cinnamon and 1 tablespoon of the pumpkin puree. Beat until very well combined. Continue beating, gradually adding the remaining pumpkin puree, until completely incorporated. Add the honey and vanilla and beat until thick and fluffy, about 2 minutes.

Serve or store in the fridge in an airtight container. Bring to room temperature before using.

Recipe Notes

If you use fresh pumpkin puree, make sure it's not too watery. If it has a lot of extra moisture, wrap in cheesecloth and squeeze out the excess water.
